### Major Safety Drill Being Planned For Spring

The Barbour County School Safety and Crisis Management Committee is in the process of designing a countywide school safety emergency drill to be conducted during the spring of 2012. The committee meets at a minimum of four times a year. Committee members include: the director of the Barbour County Office of Emergency Management, Barbour County Board of Education, county emergency squads, fire departments, local police departments, the Barbour County Sheriff's Department, WV State Police, Barbour County Health Department, DHHR, and selected teachers, principals and parents.

Though still under development, the drill will likely focus on a fictional threat at a single unnamed county school facility. The safety




committee plans to meet more frequently than usual in coming weeks to prepare for the event. The group will focus upon such topics as: establishment of county and school command posts; the potential use of out-ofcounty support agencies and canines; com-


munication modes to be used; identification of roles and responsibilities; and pre-announcements to parents and the community.

### Learn 21 Website Provides a Bonanza of Learning Resources

Are you looking for enrichment activities for those students who finish early? Learning resources for snow days? A place for students to explore new ideas or practice classroom skills? Then check out the West Virginia Department of Education's *Learn21* website.

With tabs for students, parents, teachers and the community, there is something for everyone. For example, students can click on grade-appropriate links to games and quizzes at levels PK-K, 1-2, 3-5, 6-8 and 9-12, where learning can come alive in an interactive format. The site taps students' natural interest in technology as it helps them learn as they play.



The high school link, for example, includes dozens of activities in each of the following areas: math, science, social studies, language arts, wellness, art, music, videos, web tools, and STEM. The PK-K link features a helpful "teacher" who speaks to and directs children to such areas as stories, games, videos, art and music.

## Changes on the Horizon for GED Testing in WV

West Virginia is in the planning stages for transitioning to computer-based GED testing as early as January, 2013. Barbour County will join other districts from across the state in moving from paper-based testing to an innovative test center network approach. Even the trademarked GED logo has been updated to a "swinging door" look, representing the test's gateway to success.







Under the current plans, GED Testing will team with Pearson VUE to establish approved academic channel/test centers as part of its national network. While testing fees are expected to increase, it is hoped that the WVDE will continue to offer free testing to state residents, as it has since 2008. Among the advantages cited for the change are test scheduling flexibility for examinees, the availability of other testing instruments and a quicker turnaround in score results.
