Dear Colleagues,

If the old saying “April showers bring May flowers” is true, then this month should be one of the most colorful we have had in a long time.

As you may have heard by now, the Barbour County Board of Education voted unanimously to approve Dr. Joe Super as the next Superintendent of our school system. Currently, contract negotiations are on-going and a contract signing ceremony at a Board meeting will be announced. Dr. Super is expected to begin his duties as Superintendent on July 1, 2011.

Dr. Super is currently serving as Superintendent in Pleasants County Schools. During his tenure there he has passed an excess levy and a bond to support building a new St. Mary’s High School. Previous to his tenure in Pleasants County, Dr. Super served as Director of Special Education and Assistant Superintendent in Randolph County. Welcome, Dr. Super, to Barbour County Schools!

I greatly appreciate the Board of Education and your support for me this school year as I struggled to fill the void in the position of Superintendent. All of our employees and the central office staff could not have been more supportive. I hope that this year has been a successful one for you.

I would like praise the efforts of our reading and language arts teachers, literacy coaches, and principals for the work they have done to raise student achievement. During the past few months the elementary schools and middle schools have met with our reading consultants and the feedback to us from the consultants has been very positive. From the beginning of the year benchmarks to the middle of the year benchmarks, every school has demonstrated a positive trend. All of you will probably remember that in past years we have always shown a downward trend during this same time frame. As additional evidence that the reading initiative is working, we have seen a marked decrease in the number of students moving from elementary school to middle school next year that will still need Wilson interventions. Congratulations to all of the educators that have put their heart and soul into making this initiative work. Your efforts are making a difference!

We will also begin work on two new exciting areas. The West Virginia Department of Education has mandated that all county school systems implement a Response to Intervention (RTI) model in mathematics for next school year. The county math team will begin meeting this month to start framing our model that we will begin implementing in our system next school year. Also, there was no Social Studies Textbook adoption this year. Middle and high school social studies teachers will begin work on identifying technology based resources for implementation in their classrooms for next year. This is an exciting move for these teachers as our system as the state of WV moves towards one to one computing for all students.

If you get an opportunity, please come out to the contract signing ceremony for Dr. Super to make him feel welcome.


PBHS Hosts Inaugural Career Day



On Wednesday, April 20, Philip Barbour High School held its first Career Day, sponsored by the Community Relations Committee. Students were polled to see what types of careers they would most be interested in learning more about, and 33 of the top choices were presented to the students. Students then selected the top three fields that they wanted to pursue. All students attended three forty-minute sessions in their areas of interest. The presentations gave students a brief introduction to possible future careers. The 44 presenters (above) came from a variety of areas such as the medical field, law enforcement, architecture, coaching, EMS, journalism, business, photography, education, engineering, forestry, music, and coal mining during the event, which proved to be both rewarding and educational.

County Energy Program Produces Significant Cost Savings

The energy conservation program initiated in late-2006 by Barbour County Schools has resulted in a cost reduction of about 25% over the past four years or so. Data from the end of March, 2011, shows that a savings of \$838,583 has been realized over this period. This can be measured in terms of 43,377 MMBTU or 5280 metric tons of CO₂, the equivalent of 948 passenger cars not driven for a year or 135,505 seedlings grown for five years. Everyone's cooperation is appreciated in making this initiative a success!

Over 130 applications were submitted in West Virginia during the competitive grant process. Golden Horseshoe Winners: Three Barbour County eighth graders were among those honored at the Culture Center in Charleston on May 10 as they officially became Knights and Ladies of the Golden Horseshoe Society. Hannah Gregg and Jules Harshberger of Kasson and home-schooler, Lauren Farnsworth, were among 200 students who were recognized for their knowledge of West Virginia history and culture in the annual contest that originated in 1931.
