I admit when I hear from the wise men and women of education describing the near catastrophic predictions of the effect of the pandemic on our children's ability to "Catch Up," I just shake my head in disbelief. In fact, I believe the experiences of the past fourteen months have taught all of us more than a "Normal" school year ever could have taught us.

Learning is the gaining of knowledge. It is not limited to what can be achieved in a brick and mortar classroom and happens only between teachers and students. As we have learned over the course of the last year, life and the human condition is the greatest teacher. It doesn't have content standards or pacing guides, like traditional education. It teaches us lessons, on a daily basis, whether we are ready or not, willing or not, or even want to learn.

Most children carry, in the palm of their hand, devices with more computing capability than the computers of NASA used in sending astronauts to the surface of the moon, and back. Our children have the ability to get the answers to questions in a few seconds that would have taken the people of my generation hours or days to answer. I am not saying this to diminish the importance of a formal education but to get people to relax and understand that our county, state, nation, and the entire world has lived the reality of the pandemic and most of us are in similar circumstances.

The past fourteen months has been trying for many students, staff, parents and community members. The pandemic has been the cause of unprecedented stress and anxiety regarding physical, social, emotional, and even spiritual health. We have lost friends, family, and a general feeling of control like we have never experienced before. Personally, it has been the most difficult time for me in all of my 58 years of life.

However, I do believe that this stretch of time has made all of us stronger, more appreciative of our freedom and of all of the blessings that we receive. I am proud of the work that the men and women of Barbour County Schools has done under the most trying of circumstances and I hope and pray that we all get an opportunity to spend quality time with our family and friends this summer and that we are reinvigorated to come back in the fall to what, we hope, will be a normal school year. Thanks again for your hard work and dedication to our students!

Barbour County Schools received several thousand dollars in grant dollars through the

2021 Barbour County Community Foundation earlier this year. The dollars were allocated



by the philanthropic organization for projects designed for community improvement and support of its youth. The four approved BCS proposals during the cycle included:

Philip Barbour High School: Purchases of a visitor identification card printer/reader, along with new personalized welcome mats at the high school's primary entrances.

Belington Elementary School: Funding for the purchase of several tons of pea gravel for safety in the school's play areas. Volunteers will spread and maintain the gravel.

Philippi Middle School: Purchases of pieces of outdoor playground equipment and materials to promote and enhance physical exercise by students during recess and intramural periods.

PBHS George Byrer Field: Awarded to the Promise Foundation for the purchase and installation of two new water bottle stations in the respective locker rooms at BC Bank Park.

Students who opted for home schooling during the past year are reminded that those hours and grades do not count as credits at Philip Barbour since they are not accredited by the West Virginia Department of Education. Only high school students enrolled at PBHS, the WV Virtual School or another accredited secondary school can receive high school credits for coursework that has been successfully completed.

Those who are unable to attend the pre-enrollment or make their decision to return during the summer should note the regular fall registration dates of August 10-11, 2021. Appointments for those days may also be made by calling the school at the number above.
