Many years ago, back in the late 1980's and early 90's, the summer days of mid-July were often the most peaceful and productive of the year. Such solitude gave me, as principal, brief periods to reflect on the ups and downs of the prior year, tie up any loose ends, and make plans for the approaching term.

The wind and rain were not the only intruders, as members of the animal kingdom paid visits quite often as well. In addition to the usual insects and mice, there were birds and bats, frogs and salamanders, a possum, snakes, stray dogs and even a chicken (before my time, but on good authority). One time, a momma cat raised her litter of kittens in the first floor maze of heating vents and registers.

And so, as I completed an errand near the gym one hot summer day, it shouldn't have surprised me that an object I noticed against the exterior door at the end of the hallway near the canteen turned out to a big expired toad. It had clearly been there awhile, pressed up against the glass. When I picked it up, he was dry and nearly weightless. More paper mache than animal, it reminded me of a leftover piece of the Colonel's extra crispy chicken. As I unlocked the door to dispose of the poor thing, I saw a puddle nearby in the graveled driveway and set him down in the middle of it, just in case.

At the end of the day, as I made the rounds checking doors, I remembered the toad and opened the door beyond the canteen. The puddle was empty; there was no sign of him.



Now, I suppose that a hungry dog might have sauntered past that day and found a guick snack, but that would ruin my point. I knew that amphibians were resilient creatures and could sometimes survive beyond expectations with little to no moisture. I'd like to think that he somehow absorbed enough water to escape his fate, find greener pastures and live on. It brought to mind some old sayings about never giving up and "where there's life, there's hope."

As educators, we've all encountered kids who have dried up and shown zero interest in learning, to the point that we're ready to turn our backs on them and give our best to others who seem to care. It's easy to become cynical (I have) and give up, but we never know when that one last effort might be the spark that brings a youngster back from the brink and gives him or her a fighting chance in school, in life. Thanks for your many efforts throughout this year and enjoy your summer respite – you've earned it.

# **Sun Shade Structure Grant Awarded to Junior School**

Junior Elementary School has received word that its 2019 grant project for a permanent sun shade structure has been selected for funding by the American Academy of Dermatology. The \$8000 project was prepared by the JES administration, with help from Barbour County Schools.

The large pavilion, to be strategically placed on the school's playground behind the school, will provide solar protection and a cooling station for students during recesses, physical education classes, and after-school and community events.

Junior's staff recognizes that overexposure to ultraviolet radiation from the sun is a serious health hazard, and looks forward to providing the shelter to help protect its students from skin cancer and other heat-related health problems. Construction is expected to occur during summer of 2019.

The school met grant guidelines regarding sunsafety/skin cancer awareness programming by supplementing its health lessons with EPA's SunWize curriculum, special events, guest speakers, support from a local dermatologist, and by using materials from the American Cancer Society.



### "Skate Night for Books" Blends Literacy and Activity for JES Students & Families

For the second year, more than 75 students and family members traveled to the local Skate Zone facility for a night of reading and fun.

Junior Elementary School, in partner-



ship with Barbour County's Title I program and Leaders of Literacy, hosted an evening of skating blended with drawings for selections of free books for summer reading. More than 320 books went home with students and their home libraries to help meet literacy goals and decrease the chances of the summer loss of reading skills. When student names were drawn, they reported to the book tables to make their selections. Those unable to attend made their choices at school the next day.

### Junior Elementary School Receives Top WV Sustainable Schools Grant Award for 2019

The students and staff at Junior Elementary School were excited to learn this spring that the JES proposal to begin a green healthy biking program was selected as the top project in the state. The West Virginia Sustainable Schools organization presented two 2019 awards:



\$5000 for the first place proposal and \$1000 for second place. The planning and proposal for the grant was submitted by the school administration, with assistance from Barbour County Schools.

The school plans to use the funding to purchase sets of bicycles for use by grades 2-3-4 and tricycles for grades PK-K-1, along with a set of 25 safety helmets. Arrangements have been made with a county business to provide safety training sessions for the children. The cycles will be used during recesses, physical education classes, and 15-minute "brain breaks" during academic classes.

The campus at JES has a safe paved walking trail and a parking lot conducive to biking. This project is a logical extension of the successful JES *Daily Mile* walking program, a response to Fitness-



gram data and to remedy student inattentiveness. The walking has helped students improve alertness in class, and cycling will add an interesting new level of exercise.

The class sets of cycles will allow children to use muscle power and work off excess energy, gain focus, and enjoy healthy fun pedaling with friends. And, as part of Junior's *Kid Reach* program, the school will invite families to sign out bikes and ride with their students on campus and around the school grounds during supervised outings...

### **Busy Times at Kasson School!**

Jess White, an education specialist for NASA, recently visited the school to discuss engineering and led the students in constructing rockets that they actually launched on the school playground in a competition to see which design traveled furthest.

The school's annual field trip for students, families and staff was to PNC Park and a Pittsburgh Pirates Education Day baseball game. Sponsored by the PTO, the May trip featured baseball-themed workbooks presented to each student related to math, physics and language arts skills.

#### **KidREACH Students Meet Officer Rocco**


