### County School Energy Project Completed On Time Successful Initiative To Provide Future Benefits

Barbour County Schools' recent Energy Project, funded in part by the West Virginia School Building Authority, was completed within budget and according to plan in mid-December. Entitled "Energy and Air Quality Across Barbour County," the innovative program was approved during the 2015 cycle of SBA Needs awards and was designed to benefit students and mitigate rising energy costs in the district. The total project cost of nearly \$7 million was funded primarily through the grant, with local in-kind dollars equaling some \$2.4 million contributed through the school system's own energy conservation programming.

Following its approval by the state, the project was launched countywide in the late-summer of 2015, with all existing school facilities receiving contemporary upgrades in the areas of new lighting, modern HVAC controls and conservation of energy resources. Barbour County Schools was able to document justification of the expanded plan after finding success during a similar pilot project at the Career and Technical Education Center at Philip Barbour High School earlier in the decade.



The project's Clerk of the Works, Glenn Sweet, stated that "our county was successful in achieving our goals: to improve learning environments for our students and to realize economic relief through energy conservation." Although the project's construction and development components are now complete, the resulting obligations and benefits will continue for many years.

### Report on Remedial Needs Among State College-Going Students Provides Encouraging Local Results

A December 7 article in the Charleston Gazette-Mail focused on data from students in the West Virginia graduating class of 2016 who went on to higher education. According to analyses in a report by the Higher Education Policy Commission: Community and Technical College System, a growing number of graduating state students need to take remedial classes to be ready for entry-level college classes. Statewide about 31 percent of collegegoing seniors from the group had test scores that required remediation.

While of concern to all, the picture is brighter in north central West Virginia, including Barbour County, which, at 14%, ranked fourth lowest in the Mountain State in the percentage of students who were struggling in readiness, behind only Monongalia, Marion and Jefferson Counties. The local 2016 graduates bucked the trend of low socio-economic conditions traditionally being strong predictors of limited college success.



### A GOLD STAR SEASON

The fall athletic season at Philip Barbour High School will likely be long-remembered as one of the most outstanding in Colt history. The August to November window saw a state championship, two near misses and the tying of a 53-year old record.

The 2017 edition of Lady Colts volleyball continued the program's recent dominance of Class AA play with its third consecutive state championship in Charleston, topping Winfield in the finals. The state crown earned was the fourth overall for PBHS teams and head coach, Heather Halfin, as the Colts made a remarkable 16th straight trip to the Civic Center. The all-tournament squad featured four Lady Colts: senior Maddi Carpenter; juniors Jyra Casto and McKenzie Carpenter; and sophomore Kilea Payne.

The Philip Barbour Colt football team exceeded all expectations by posting a record-tying 8-2 mark during the regular season. The win total matched the George Byrer-coached squad of 1964, as PB snapped a long losing streak in the opener at Grafton and never looked back, upsetting higher ranked teams in the season's two finales to claim a spot in the Class AA playoffs for the first time since 2013. First-year coach Russ Collett's team was ousted in the first round by a strong Point Pleasant team, but the Colts served notice that they are a program to be reckoned with in the future. PB players who earned all-state recognition include: seniors, Hunter Mason (1st team), Jakob McCord, Hunter Gainer, Matthew McCoy, Cameron Kollo; and junior, Chase Collier (2nd team).

A tradition of excellence continued for the Colt cross-country teams as the Girls claimed second place in the AA state meet and the Boys finished third. Jessica Melvin earned the state individual girls' championship, while teammate, Kierra Hodge, finished fourth. On the boys' side, the Colts were paced by Noah Ward, who came in fourth. Coach Jim Seaton's squads, like their volleyball and football classmates, helped bring "Colt Pride" alive in the fall of 2017.

### County Adult Ed. Program to Offer Microsoft Office Specialist Course

In January the Barbour County Adult Education Program will offer a Microsoft Office Specialist class to local citizens aged 18 and older. The semesterlong course will be held in the Adult Education room from 1-3 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at the Career and Technical Center beginning on January 10. Adult Education registration and enrollment is required prior to the first class (call 457-4807 for more information). The course can lead to MOS certification for those who complete the course and pass the exam. The program is cost-free to those who meet basic qualifications.

### Kindergarten – PK Registration in County Is Set for February 2nd

Barbour County Schools will enroll students for its 2018-19 kindergarten and pre-kindergarten programs on Friday, February 2, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the auxiliary gymnasium at Philip Barbour High School. A make-up date of Friday, February 9 has been established, if needed, at the same time and location.

Enrollment packets will be provided at registration, but they can also be picked up ahead of time on or after January 29 from either Philippi Head Start, 183 Chestnut Street, Philippi, or Barbour County Schools, 45 School Street, Philippi. They can also be downloaded and printed from the Barbour County Schools website.

Children who are currently attending a Pre-K program will not need to register. Parents are reminded that West

Virginia code mandates that children must attend a state-approved kindergarten program prior to entering first grade. WVBE Policy 2525 has been amended to adjust the early childhood program age attainment date from age 4 prior to



September 1 to age 4 prior to July 1 (e.g. June 30 or earlier). Children turning 4 years of age in July or August will not be enrolled in pre-kindergarten for 2018-19, but will instead enroll for the following school year.

### **FUND**-amental Additions Support Philippi Middle Science Classes



The science students in Angie McDaniel's classes at Philippi Middle School have benefited greatly by the fundraising efforts of their veteran teacher. The department has raised nearly \$10,000 for needed equipment and supplies through a successful State Department STEM grant and eight Donors Choose awards during the first semester of the current term.
